Historic St. Mary's City — 1634-1695 Historic St. Mary's City has a working farm as part of the museum's attractions. The Spray family's recreated 1660s tobacco plantation, tucked away on the banks of St. Andrew's Creek, contains the main house, tenant house, and tobacco houses (barns), as well as the crops, gardens, orchards, livestock, and fencing that a successful planter would have owned.

The plantation was once again the key to local commercial success. By 1860, there were 4 million slaves in the US, some 60% of whom worked in cotton.
